Greetings architects! It's our final day together! We have had such a fun time exploring design and monuments with you this week!

You have learned about different monuments across the world and how they come in many shapes and sizes. You have learned how monuments tell stories and bring up different feelings. You have also learned about who has historically been represented through monuments and whose stories have been left out.

By choosing to dedicate your monument to your hero, you are making sure that your hero's story is being told for others to learn about! It's important to tell stories that haven't been told before or have been forgotten. When we tell these stories, we can make sure everyone has the opportunity to be seen and heard by their community. Everyone deserves a chance to have their story told.

Just like an architect and designer, you started off this week by asking questions and brainstorming about your hero, which then led you to research and find ways to communicate your design ideas. You then got feedback from those around you, made revisions, and then refined your design even more. Now, you are officially at the **create** stage of the design process and get to transform your drawings into a three-dimensional model of your monument!

We're going to keep today's lesson short so that you can get started on building. We can't wait to see your final model!


Keep these materials nearby as you work through today's lesson

Day 5 Activity: Build Your Monument!

Just like an architect, you are getting ready to hand over your final drawings to a contractor who will build the structure. Except in this case, you get to be the contractor, too!

Now that you've watched the final camp video, put on your construction hat and get to building a model of your monument! As you build, think about how to make your monument the best representation of your hero and core principles.

How will you express the different materials your monument is made of? How will you show specific design details? If your monument is made of bricks, for example, you wouldn't actually use bricks to create your model, right? But you could use a reddish-brown piece of paper and draw a brick pattern on it.

Look around your house for recycled items that you can use in your model. Get creative! There is no wrong way to do it!









As you get close to finishing your model, think about the step in the design process where we improve our designs. Now that you've designed a monument for your hero, what would you change or improve? Does your design reflect your core principles? Does it tell your hero's story?

It's impossible to get everything right the first time, which is why it's called the design process. There is always room for improvement, and it's OK if something doesn't work the way that you want the first time. You can keep using your creative mind to problem solve!


** Bonus Challenge: Create a Historical Marker!
